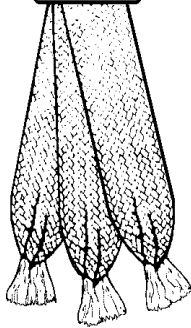


# Webelos--10 years old

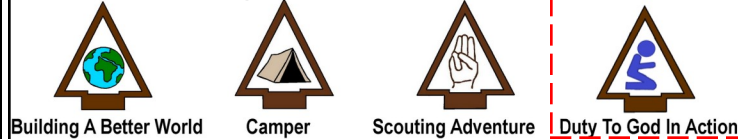


**Webelos Colors**

## Arrow of Light Required Adventures

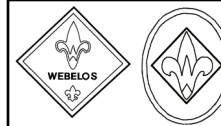

Religious Pins for Webelos and Arrow of Light **ARE earned with the family.**

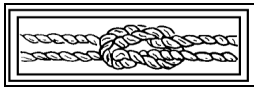


## Webelos Badge

Can be round or diamond shaped. To earn, a boy must complete the 5 required Webelos Adventures and 2 Elective Webelos Adventures, been active in the Webelos Den for 3 months, pass off the Cyber Chip, and do with parents the *How to Protect Your Child from Child Abuse* in the front of the Webelos Book. Because it is the Highest Award in Cub Scouting it is always awarded with a special ceremony. Arrow of Light Awards can look very different (ALL have a real arrow though) and be presented in many different ways. This is the Highest Award Cub Scouting offers and the **ONLY** one worn on the Boy Scout Uniform.



**Arrow of Light Award** - (It is the Cub Scout equivalent of Eagle) It comes in a patch or a pin. A mothers pin is also presented to the boy for his mom. The Webelos Badge is NOT required to earn the Arrow of Light anymore. To earn the Arrow of Light a boy must be 10, have completed the 4 required Arrow of Light Adventures and 3 Elective Webelos Adventures, have been active in the Webelos den for 6 months, pass off the Cyber Chip and do with parents the *How to Protect Your Child from Child Abuse* in the front of the Webelos Book. Because it is the Highest Award in Cub Scouting it is always awarded with a special ceremony. Arrow of Light Awards can look very different (ALL have a real arrow though) and be presented in many different ways. This is the Highest Award Cub Scouting offers and the **ONLY** one worn on the Boy Scout Uniform.
